Smart Start was excited to debut our new community-based newsletter in May. Over the past two months, we asked our community partners, child care providers, staff members, and parents who receive our newsletter to offer recommendations for the name. We collected 17 different recommended names for the newsletter.

During the monthly meeting of the Butler County Child and Family Development Task Force on July 20, we asked attendees to choose the one or two names they liked the most. 9 of the 17 recommendations received votes.

At that point, we did a web search to find out if other programs had claimed the titles for their own; 3 of the 9 titles had to be crossed off our list.

We were then down to 6 titles from which to choose. The Smart Start Advisory Committee members were asked to anonymously vote, via Survey Monkey. The vote was unanimous and "Butler Kids" was chosen as the name for our newsletter which coincides with the name of our website ButlerKids.org.

Thank you, to the many friends who sent recommendations to us as we prepared to chose the name. We continue to be excited about this community-based publication for the Early Childhood Professionals of Butler County and the families they serve. Teaching Children to Practice Acts of Kindness

From: Sandbox Learning

Being kind to other people and yourself is important for being a good friend and being happy. Modeling kindness, reflecting on kind actions, and practicing acts of kindness can help children develop this skill.

- Be a Role Model: When you say unkind things about other people or yourself, children learn this is acceptable behavior. Say kind things about co-workers, neighbors, family members, people in the community, and yourself.
- 2. Use Lists: Have your kids write


lists or make collages that represent what they like about their friends, family members, and people at school. Hang the creation where classmates and friends can see them. Have children make a similar project about themselves.

- 3. Read and Write Stories: Read stories about kindness and respect in school and at home. Ask Kids to share times when they were kind and when people were kind to them.
- 4. Practice Kindness: Teach Kids to

- help other people in day to day situations. Have them role play what they would do to be helpful.
- 5. Learning to do Kind Things for Yourself: Have kids write or draw about things they like to do that make them feel good about themselves. Discuss how to decrease stress.
- Pick a Cause or Charity: A long term investment in a volunteer or charity activity teaches children that even a small amount of time and energy can make a big difference.

Butler County Child and Family Development Task Force

At 11 am the third Wednesday of every month, in the basement of Bradford Memorial Library in El Dorado, a very special group of people come together to discuss early childhood initiatives in in Kansas and how we can impact the young children of Butler County.

The group meets as the Interagency Coordinating Council for our area whose vision is "The Butler County Child and Family Development Task Force, with community support, ensure quality, available, and affordable childcare, early childhood education, children's health services and family support for all children in Butler County."





The "Task Force" met in October 2010 for strategic planning. Work is fun when you do it with friends!

A typical meeting enjoys 18 to 20 attendees who begin by sharing agency updates and happenings across the county that pertain to young children and their families, then a guest speaker presents information about a particular program in the county.

This is this group of people who guide us in our efforts as we write and implement the Smart Start grant.

The chair of the task force is Sue Barrientos, the Coordinator of the Early Childhood Program at Butler Community College. Audra Kenneson, Smart Start Coordinator, serves as the facilitator of the meetings.

Meet a Butler Early Childhood Professional

The vision of Smart Start of Butler county is "Butler County Smart Start will improve and expand early childhood experiences and care for children to ensure they enter school ready to succeed."

The Smart Start Coordinator works to meet that vision. Audra Kenneson became the coordinator in August 2007.

Audra grew up in Butler County. She went to El Dorado schools and when she was in the 9th grade her family moved to Rosalia where she graduated from Flinthills High School. She received her Bachelor's Degree in

from Smart Start of Butler County

Elementary Education from Kansas State University in 1991.

Audra taught at Eureka Alternative High School until she earned her Master's Degree in Social Work from WSU in 2004. She worked on a reintegration grant with the Kansas Juvenile Justice Authority in El Dorado. When that grant ended, Audra was a Juvenile Intake and Assessment worker which she continued doing on a part-time basis after she was hired by Rainbows United, Inc. to coordinate the Smart Start Grant.

Smart Start is housed in Rainbows' El Dorado office, located at 409 N. Main. There Audra supervises two Mental Health Specialists who work with families and child care providers to address behavior issues in young children. Besides her duties of



managing the daily operations of the Smart Start Grant, Audra is the lead Incredible Years instructor in Butler County and she coordinates trainings for child care providers throughout each grant year. She is a part-time instructor in the Early Childhood Program at Butler Community College.

Audra is the mother of toy poodles, Gabby and Gidget, who occasionally come to the office with her.
